The Top 5 List: Top Five Things Defense Counsel Tells You That You Should Ouestion

My May 2014 Top 5 list dealt with things that claimant's counsel tells you that you should question.

Here are the top 5 things you should question that your own defense counsel tells you:

1. "There Is Nothing Going On In This File"

This is an answer you should <u>never</u> accept. If your counsel is doing their job, they

should always be aggressively moving a case forward. Even if a claimant is still treating, your attorney should be proactively managing treatment to ensure that it is progressing as expected and moving the case to closure.

2. "Your Chances Of Success Are 50/50"

"Your chances of success are 50/50." You are paying your attorneys good money for their expertise. While it's impossible to give these percentages with exact certainty, a capable attorney should be able to give you a more accurate estimate than 50/50.

3. "Arbitrator ___ Is Assigned To This Case, Therefore It's A Winner/Loser"

It's very rare that the assignment of a particular arbitrator affects the case one way or the other. The days of arbitrators being very liberal or very conservative are over, which is a good thing. For the most part, all arbitrators decide cases on the merits, regardless of their background, perceived political affiliation or other factors.

4. "This Case Is Not Ready To Settle"

There is no such thing as a case that's not ready to settle. Any case can settle at any time with some motivation, ingenuity and thinking outside the box. There is no wrong time to settle a claim.

5. "This Is Illinois After All"

This is probably my least favorite thing to hear from any defense counsel. Illinois does

have a reputation as being one of the more difficult states for employers. That doesn't mean that you should throw up your hands and accept defeat. We successfully win cases every day in Illinois. You can too.

Credit Where Credit is Due

The recent case of Swetland v. Illinois State of/Pinckneyville Corrections Center, 22 ILWCLB 96 (IL. W.C. Comm. 2014), clarifies that credit for a previous settlement or award will only apply if a later claim

results in a greater level of permanency.

Several years before the instant case, Petitioner injured his left knee and settled his claim for 25% loss of use of his left leg. Several years later, Petitioner injured his left knee while working as a correctional officer. Petitioner testified Αt trial. that experiences difficulty climbing stairs and playing with his children, that his left knee pops and swells and that he takes over-thecounter medication daily. The arbitrator awarded 5% loss of use of the left leg. However, because of Petitioner's previous settlement of 25% of the left leg, the arbitrator credited that prior settlement against this award and awarded permanency.

On review, the Commission ruled that the arbitrator erroneously applied the credit from the previous settlement to void the new award. The Commission highlighted that following the arbitrator's reasoning would result in the "patently absurd" the determination that Petitioner's permanency of his leg is less now than it was after the earlier accident. Therefore, the Commission ruled that credit is only properly applied where the present permanency is greater than the permanency at the time the earlier settlement or award was entered. In this case, the Commission modified the decision and awarded Petitioner 30% loss of use of the left leg, against which the previous 25% award was

credited, which resulted in a total award of 5% loss of use of the left leg.

Practice Tip:

Credit for a previous settlement or award will only be applied if a subsequent claim results in a greater level of permanency. As the Commission did in the *Swetland* case, this creates the potential for permanency to be determined not just based on the current level of disability but also based on consideration of the net effect of any applicable awards or settlements to be credited.

Rolling Into Employment By: Rick Warner



In Bacheldor v. Walmart, 22 ILWCLB 88 (IL. W.C. Comm. 2014), Petitioner was attempting to sit on a rolling chair, rolling on a smooth floor, with no mats or carpeting. The chair rolled away from her

causing her to fall. The Commission held that the injuries "arose out of and in the course of her employment."

The arbitrator cited *Poole v. Cook County Medical Examiner*. In *Poole*, the petitioner fell when his chair rolled away from him when he reached for a file. There, the Commission found that "wheeled, swiveling office chairs are less stable than most chairs and that one who sits at work in such a chair on a linoleum surface is exposed to risks greater than that to which a member of the public is exposed."

Practice Tip:

Employers should ensure that mats are placed below all rolling chairs when possible to avoid claims such as these. Additionally, each incident should be carefully investigated, no matter how seemingly routine or unlikely.


