Top 5 Ways To Reduce Your Legal Expenses

1/Manage Your Vendors

Whether it's attorneys, surveillance experts, TPA's or any other kind of service provider, it is very important to keep these expenses in check. While vendors are worthwhile investments, they are also one of the leading cost drivers in our field. Accordingly, it is crucial to hire professionals with a single-minded focus on achieving the best results in a cost effective manner.

2/Limit Medical Expenses

Medical bills are a leading cost driver. Closely monitoring medical treatment, being aggressive with return to work, employing the fee schedule and, most importantly, aggressively fighting questionable medical charges is important. Also, aggressive use of tools like IME's and UR will also help manage your medical costs.

3/Conduct Thorough Accident Investigations

Reducing legal expenses starts at the ground level, before you hire counsel. Nail down the stories of key witnesses and secure evidence as soon as possible. This will prevent you from having to pay investigators to track down this information. It will also protect you from costly and time-consuming spoliation of evidence exposure.

4/ Use Effective Negotiation Strategies

Never start off too high. Use ADR early and often. Start negotiating (on your terms) as early as possible. These are a few of many negotiation strategies that will reduce your expenses.

5/Hire The Right Attorney

Statute Of Limitation Doesn't Bar Evidence

In *PPG Indus. v. Illinois Workers' Comp. Comm'n*, 2014 IL App (4th) 130698WC, the Court addressed whether the Act's 3-year statute of limitation bars evidence regarding job activities from more than 3 years prior to the alleged accident date.

Petitioner alleged a 3/22/10 repetitive trauma injury to her left shoulder resulting from her work with Respondent. At trial, Petitioner testified regarding the work she performed during her 38-year history working for Respondent. Respondent's counsel objected to Petitioner's testimony regarding work performed prior to 3/22/07 based on the 3-year statute of limitation. The arbitrator overruled Respondent's counsel's objections, finding that Petitioner's left shoulder injury was compensable. The Commission made only minor corrections to the award. However, the Circuit Court remanded back to the Commission and granted Respondent's interlocutory order certifying the issue to the Appellate Court.

The Appellate Court affirmed the Commission's decision and held that the statute of limitation does not bar evidence

Practice Tip:

In evaluating the compensability of a claim, remember that the statute of limitation only bars certain claims from being filed, but does not bar the admission of evidence.

of work activities occurring more than 3 years prior to the accident date or manifestation date of a repetitive trauma injury.

Injury In A Restricted Work Area Restricts Benefits

In *Dawson v. CR Coating & Logistics Mgmt.,* 12 IL. W.C. 29594 (Ill.Indus.Com'n Apr. 7, 2014), the Commission addressed whether an injury sustained by an employee acting outside the scope of his or her duties is compensable.

Petitioner worked as a Team Lead, requiring that he ensure machines were running and that team members performed their jobs. On the accident date, he identified a problem with a machine, which he knew

how to fix, as he had done so before. He met with the machine operator, hit the safety shut down button on the machine and entered the machine area to fix the machine. Petitioner injured his head while working on the machine.


Practice Tip:

Always determine whether a claimant was acting within the scope of his or her authorized job duties at the time of injury. If not, this may be a basis for denying the claim. Prompt and thorough accident reporting and detailed job descriptions can be particularly helpful in making this determination.

The Commission denied benefits, finding that Petitioner entered a restricted area when he attempted to repair the machine, which he was neither qualified nor authorized to do. Moreover, Petitioner entered the restricted area through the belt area, rather than the doorway, to avoid setting off the alarm, further evidencing that Petitioner acted outside the scope of his prescribed duties.
