Top 5 Questions To Ask A Potential IME Doctor

1/ Are you board certified?

Board certification is not mandatory to practice medicine. However, it is almost a necessity when choosing an expert, as it connotes a certain level of expertise that you need in a retained physician.

2/ What percentage of your practice is devoted to litigation?

The best experts are ones that spend most of their time treating patients, more credible than professional litigants. There is no magic number, but stay away from doctors who spend more than 15% of their time on litigation.

3/ Any disciplinary actions?

This is easily searchable on various web sites. It is important to know if your expert has had any disciplinary actions or medical malpractice cases that may adversely affect their credibility.

4/ Are you an expert in the specific subspecialty?

Hire an expert with a long and credible track record with the specific body part he or she is examining. A doctor who has treated thousands of patients with a similar condition is more credible than a generalist.

5/ How much work do you do for employees?

You want a doctor who works for both Petitioners and Respondents. One who exclusively represents employers could be perceived as a hired gun by the Commission.

IME: The Earlier The Better

In *James v. Chicago Transit Authority*, 17 WC 186, the Commission affirmed the arbitrator's award of prospective medical treatment based on causation.

Petitioner, a bus driver, tripped and fell while working. Petitioner had a history of knee

arthrosis. An MRI revealed that Petitioner sustained a partial PCL tear and had meniscal defects. Petitioner's treating physician diagnosed right knee end-stage osteoarthritis and recommended a total knee replacement. Respondent's IME physician opined that Petitioner sustained a temporary aggravation of the pre-existing right knee condition. However, the arbitrator found that Petitioner's condition was causally related to her work injury.

On appeal, the Commission affirmed the arbitrator's causation decision. The Commission found it significant that Petitioner consistently complained and treated for right knee pain since the work injury and that Petitioner's treating physician opined that the work injury caused or accelerated her condition. The Commission determined that there was sufficient evidence to award prospective medical benefits as Petitioner sustained more than a temporary aggravation of her pre-existing left knee arthrosis.

In a dissenting opinion, Commissioner Simpson opined that there was enough evidence to deny Petitioner's prospective medical benefits as 4 months after the work injury, Petitioner's treating physician had opined that Petitioner's knee had resolved "nicely."

Practice Tip:

If a claimant has a pre-existing condition, get an IME early on to fight causation.

Concurrent Wages?

In *Bagwell v. IWCC*, 2017 IL App (4th) 160407 WC, the Appellate Court affirmed the arbitrator's denial of concurrent wages based on lack of notice.

Petitioner worked for Respondent for 27 years and also earned wages as a pastor for another employer. During that time, Respondent was

aware that Petitioner served as a pastor as members of Respondent's management attended weddings and funerals that Petitioner officiated.

On appeal, the Court found that Petitioner's wages as a pastor were properly <u>excluded</u> as Petitioner did not meet his burden of proving that Respondent was aware of his concurrent employment. The Court found it significant that Petitioner never offered any substantive evidence or disclosed wages he earned as a pastor to Respondent. The Court ruled that Sec. 10's concurrent wage requirements applied <u>only</u> if Respondent knew that Petitioner had other paid work at the time of the work injury.

Practice Tip:

If a claimant has concurrent employment, ask whether the insured was aware of not only the concurrent activity, but whether they were aware of concurrent wages.
