What your supervisor needs is ultimately what we as your attorney need: **evidence**.

Obviously, the who, what, when, where and why of the accident is important. Pull video. Interview co-workers. Preserve evidence. You want your supervisor gathering all of that basic information so that they can determine what happened and how to avoid it future accidents.

From a claims perspective, your supervisor should find out not only what happened, but what didn't happen. Were there witnesses? Suspicious activity? Was there any other possible motivators for the claim, like disciplinary action? Those factors in and of themselves may not be enough to warrant a denial. However, they will certainly raise red flags that cause you to dig deeper into what otherwise may appear to be a routine accident.

Legislative Update

Since the veto session has ended and as we wait for wait for Governor-Elect Pritzker to be sworn in, there has been no new proposed legislation. However, we expect 2019 to usher in many changes to the workers' compensation landscape from new arbitrators, commissioners, chairperson and legislation.

Importantly, Illinois has moved from the 8th highest in WC premiums (in 2016) to 22nd highest (in 2018) representing one of the largest drops in the country. We believe this drastic change is due to reforms in 2011 that helped lower the fee schedule and reduce PPD awards. Hopefully, lawmakers will see the positive changes that have been done and keep building on it.

At the Commission, Nancy Lindsay announced her retirement and Ketki Steffen was elected to the Circuit Court bench.

Don't Do Your Best, Do My Best

In Harrington v. City of Chicago, 26 ILWCLB 162 (III. W.C. Comm. 2018), IWCC affirmed a wage differential arbitration award that was based upon Petitioner's subpar job search efforts.

Petitioner, a sanitation laborer who injured her shoulder, earned approximately \$36.21/ hr. After post-surgery FCE, Petitioner was

discharged with permanent restrictions. The employer could not accommodate the restrictions and started vocational rehabilitation.

A labor market survey indicated that Petitioner could obtain employment earning between \$9-\$14.00/hr. However, due to Petitioner's subpar job search efforts, she did not secure any interviews or employment. The arbitrator found that Petitioner exhibited "less than maximum effort." Because of this, it was reasonable to use the highest paying job for which Petitioner was qualified to calculate the wage differential.

Practice Tip:

Carefully scrutinize a petitioner's job search efforts during vocational rehabilitation. Evidence of less than maximum effort can support a lower wage differential award.

IWCC Reverses Benefits in Icy Parking Lot Case

In Smith v. Manhattan Park District, 11WC019917; 17IWCC0462, IWCC reversed the Arbitrator's award of benefits for Petitioner's injuries from a slip and fall in an icy parking lot while walking into work.

The arbitrator found that since Petitioner would not have been in the parking lot but for the fact that Petitioner had to work that

day, the accident was compensable and awarded benefits.

On appeal, IWCC reversed, finding that situational risk (Petitioner would not have been in the parking lot but for having to work) is not sufficient under the Act to establish a compensable accident. IWCC highlighted that the parking lot contained a natural accumulation of snow, there was no evidence that Respondent contributed to the hazardous condition and that the parking lot was open to the general public. Consequently, IWCC found that the accident did not arise out of and in the course of Petitioner's employment and reversed the arbitrator's award of benefits.

Practice Tip:

For parking lot cases involving snow and ice, evidence demonstrating that the snow/ice was a natural accumulation can bolster our accident defense. As such, be sure to secure photographic evidence of parking lot conditions as soon as possible after a reported accident.
